Stating that before answering a letter from Mr. Abell, he wishes to be able to express himself in terms of mutual forgiveness. He has given them much trouble, not even repaid personal courtesies, but out of respect for Mr. Teneyck and Mr. Terril, he would suggest to "Let bygones be bygones", that was the request of the President of the U.S. in the case of Mr. Brown, and he asks as a personal favor that the same principle be extended Mr. Abell. His errors were in part from inexperience, but principally from the advice of others, with whom he never ought to have associated, which he is convinced Mr. Abell now sees. He is personally interested in obtaining authority, on the part of the Government, to assure him that no action will be brought against him, which

he cannot do while any intention of a prosecution remains,
and it rests with the Attorney General to overcome this
difficulty.
