Expects to retire soon from official life and live on his Estates on Kauai. He has no hostile feeling towards the American Missionaries. Wishes only to remove all obstacles that impair their usefulness. No one here wishes to prosecute or persecute them if they only will be careful not to provoke it. He has long known that they desired him out of office, considering him an obstacle to annexation. There was a conspiracy in the Legislature of 1854 to effect this. Before leaving office he hopes to leave the King safe from annexation to any Foreign Country. Quotes the remarks of the Rev. Mr. Green of Makawao wherein he called C.C. Harris a scoundrel.
